Safe Swaddling and Developmental Dysplasia of the Hip

On behalf of Kids Health First, we would like to share information about safe swaddling with our members. Tim Schrader, M.D., Medical Director of Children's Healthcare of Atlanta Hip Program, has previously provided our members with educational information about the successful launch of the Developmental Dysplasia Hip Program, completed in 2010. Dr. Schrader, a pediatric orthopedist with Children's Orthopedics of Atlanta, and a member of the Georgia Pediatric Subspecialists, IPA also helped guide the development of the following information related to safe swaddling.

Swaddling mimics the comfort of the womb and has many benefits, if done correctly. Conversely, studies have shown that improper swaddling, with the infant's legs held closely together and the knees and hips extended, can lead to developmental dysplasia of the hip (DDH). Recently, Dr. Schrader and Children's Hip Program implemented a safe swaddling initiative. The goal of this initiative is to educate medical professionals in the community about safe swaddling techniques, so they can teach families and caregivers how to swaddle correctly.
